





LAF-SUPPORTED PLAINTIFFS WIN SETTLEMENT

In January 2016, the plaintiffs in the LAF-Supported case, *Moshak v.University of Tennessee* successfully settled their Title IX lawsuit against the university. As a part of the settlement the university will pay more than \$1 million.

The plaintiffs claim they were unlawfully discriminated against and eventually forced out of their positions during a university-led merger of the men's and women's athletic departments.

Gender discrimination in sports remains a significant problem for athletes as well as for coaches and administrators who support women's athletics The Moshak plaintiffs shared a professional commitment to women's athletics at a university that has a rich history of excellence in women's sports. Their allegations show just how pervasive discrimination against women's sports and women athletes can be. AAUW congratulates the plaintiffs and is proud to have supported the case.



To Kill a Mockingbird

The setting for To Kill a Mocking Bird is a small southern town in the 1930s' certainly different from a small southern town in the 21st century. Then people were just recovering from the Great Depression and money for most families was at a premium. Outside most small towns in the south were small dirt farmers where life was a struggle just to provide for the basic family needs. Yet there was community that included class, race and all the variations of the human circus. There was no mass communications as we have today and children roamed at will. Mothers didn't worry, because everyone knew the children and it was virtually impossible to away with anything. That was the life of Scout, Jem and Dill, a life of innocence until Atticus becomes the attorney for Tom Robinson, a black man is charged with rape and murder of a white woman. All of the deeply held issues of class, courage, compassion and gender descended upon them.
