Turning on the Light for Human Trafficking Victims

Our human trafficking intervention team from our AAUW of Alexandria branch has been striving to light a flame and help rescue human trafficking victims. Our team now consists of: Dr. M. Elizabeth Hendrix, Ms. Diane Schrier, Ms. Lane Stone, Dr. Gail Kalin, Ms. Lalitha Mani, and Dr. Dev Mani. Also, we have partnered with Chief Michael Brown and Commonwealth Attorney Bryan Porter of Alexandria, Virginia as well as the Northern Virginia Community College's Braden Women's Center and John Carter, a film director and producer.

We have made great strides in our three-pronged approach to combat human trafficking with educational awareness, advocacy, and research and development. We presented information about human trafficking and its history at a conference with the Braden Women's Center in March of 2019. We partnered with John Carter who showcased his new film "American Exploitation: The Slaves Among Us" for the conference participants. Additionally, we began our lobbying efforts to advocate for better policies in the spring.

On July 27, 2019, Elizabeth, Diane, Gail and Lane presented our three-pronged approach along with statistical and historical data about human trafficking at the AAUW of Virginia's Summer Leadership Meeting in Harrisonburg, VA. At this meeting, we focused on present global and Virginia issues, plus our rescue tool that we are developing, the AAUW Angel App with an Angel Alert.

The AAUW Angel App will have three buttons for people silently to use to contact 911, a trained investigator, and/or report any warning signs of human trafficking to the authorities. The Angel App can start an Angel Alert as well. If it is an emergency, the person can hit an emergency button which will alert 911 to their emergency and start a tracker on their phone. If it is not an emergency, but the person needs help, there will be another button for non-emergencies which the person can hit to send information to a trained investigator and/or start the tracker. The third button will be a reporting button for concerned citizens to report a case and/or warning signs that they have encountered to the authorities.

At this summer Leadership meeting, we also requested branch support for the Angel App throughout Virginia. We will be applying for grants this fall and next spring, and we want to list that we have support from every branch in Virginia. Currently, we are working on our application for the AAUW Community Action grant. Additionally, we plan to pilot the AAUW Angel App and Angel Alert in Alexandria, Virginia with the hope that eventually it can spread it throughout Virginia, the United States, and then internationally. Please continue to support our efforts however you can. Please be a light to the human trafficking victims; please change their world for the better!


