The following list is of NINE things a woman couldn't do in 1971 – yes the date is correct, 1971.

- 8. Obtain health insurance at the same monetary rate as a man. (changed in 2010)
- 9. Take the birth control pill. (Changes varied from state to state.)

Oh, and one more thing, prior to 1880 the age of consent for sex was set at 10 or 12 in more states, with the exception of Delaware – where it was **7 YEARS OLD**!

SPECIAL INITIATIVES



WOMEN BUILDING CROSS-CULTURAL FRIENDSHIPS

On a gorgeous fall night, 23 women gathered in a lovely outdoor venue to continue building cross-cultural friendships. This was the second of a multi-phased initiative—the first last March—to create an informal, diverse and inclusive women's group in our community. In September, we were treated to a variety of delicious and interesting food reflecting many foreign and American regional cultures and traditions. After introducing ourselves, each participant described the food she brought and its meaning for her.

We then engaged as small groups to discuss how we could further interest women in our area from different cultural backgrounds—US and foreign born—to come together to build new friendships. In

addition to an outreach effort as we had done for the March event, several women suggested emphasizing newcomers to the area. At several of the tables, there was considerable interest in learning more about AAUW and our Branch as they talked about how to engage even more women. The small groups were also asked to discuss what we could do to get to know one another better during our next gathering. The value of chatting as a way of connecting was highlighted, especially in this tech-intense environment in which we live when we often trade electronic exchanges for face-to-face interaction. Also discussed was the value of doing a project together for the community. One table suggested asking group members to share a special skill or knowledge to stimulate learning and growth on issues of importance to participants.

We brainstormed a variety of possible venues given the constraints around budget, individual resources, and accessibility. All agreed that the Alexandria public libraries afford us good exposure in the community. Moreover, they are all accessible and allow food, which participants felt was a great addition to any gathering. Lane and Bonnie will explore partnering with Beatley or Burke Libraries, which will allow us to use the venue without charge. After lively and enthusiastic conversations, the group seemed eager to gather again before the end of the year. Hopefully, we can arrange a time for early December. watch for further notices.
