#### **HUMAN TRAFFICKING SEMINAR**

On September 20th, I attended the John McCain Institute, Combatting Human Trafficking Symposium, organized with its partner, the Howard G. Buffet Foundation. The McCain Institute has entered into the first public-private partnership with the Dept. of Health and Human Services for Children and Families to build a national strategy to protect children from exploitation. Many corporations are now joining them.

Opening remarks on the urgency of the problem were given by Ambassador Kurt Volker and Cindy McCain. There was a panel on how to help young people who have been rescued with their emotional, psychological and physical needs. It was emphasized that young people need the knowledge and skills to avoid exploitation and human trafficking. A discussion focused on the need to create sustainable goals and processes in the system along with the need to get a diversity of programs and strategies to manage the multitude of diversity of victims' needs.

With Sex Trafficking victims, the acknowledged majority are girls, but boys are drastically underreported. The numbers vary but at this time it is assumed that it is 41 million victims. A Labor

Trafficking survivor stated, there is no difference between labor and sex trafficking. They overlap and are the same. Dame Sara Thornton, UK Independent Anti-Slavery Commissioner spoke a lot about labor trafficking in which a larger percentage is male. She quoted Teddy Roosevelt "The credit belongs to the man or woman who is actually in the arena." In the UK, 60% are male, of which 40% are minors. The Council of European Intervention has asked companies of over 35,000 people to institute training about Human Trafficking. (Afterwards she and I discussed Brexit, the possible leaving of Scotland and Ireland, and the increase in human trafficking problems that could occur due to the interruption of information flow.

Sen. Jacky Rosen then talked about some of the problems being faced in Congress and the need to reaffirm the VAWA.

A young woman talked about her being given to a family to go to the US to get an education. Her parents were promised she would go to school, and be treated like a daughter. Instead she worked every day, never went to school and was a slave. She was also raped. After being rescued at 17, she

received her GED, her BA and is in a doctoral program.

A Labor Trafficking Forum discussed the hierarchy of migrant farmworkers and the horrid conditions that they faced. They were promised \$11 an hour. The pay actually came to \$1-\$3 per hour. worked more than 16 hours per day and received no overtime. They would have their passports taken, be locked up, threatened with being deported, and harm to their families in their home countries, and abused, all the time allegedly running up debts at the owner's stores. They were given inadequate food, water and rest and lived in cramped, infested trailers. Overall the kind of treatment that will occur depends on the type of visas. Overseas American factories are even worse in their treatment of the workers.

The types of traumas were discussed that victims face: individual, interpersonal, and collective. The needs of victims include physical and psychological safety, empowerment, and peer

support. Collaboration, trustworthiness, transparency and the victim's history must be given to each victim. Means of bringing traffickers to Justice were discussed.

There was a discussion about the work being done in Florida, where it is an epidemic. They have investigated more than 8,000 cases since 2011. These children are twice as likely to have experienced abuse and 13x as likely to have experienced sexual abuse. The specialized placements that the children receive include staff with specialized skills, engagement, homelike settings, tailored services and safety measures.

It ended with ways that federal law allows compensation for victims from traffickers.

## Moving Forward: AAUW Virginia's Diversity and Inclusion Initiative and Alexandria Branch's "Women Building Cross-Cultural Friendships"

As many of you already know, AAUW of Virginia is committed to "diversity in principle and in practice." "AAUW values and seeks an inclusive membership, workforce, leadership team, and board of directors," according to the Virginia AAUW website. Furthermore, it states explicitly that there "shall be no barriers to full participation in this organization on the basis of age, disability, ethnicity, gender, gender identity, geographical location, national origin, race, religious beliefs, sexual orientation, or socioeconomic status." Cyndi Shanahan, the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Chair of AAUW of Virginia, is all about ensuring this statement is a reality at every level of the organization.

As a part of her effort, on September 24, 2019 Cyndi held the first ever phone conversation for AAUW diversity representatives from around the state. Fourteen branches participated, discussing their various initiatives. As the representative from Alexandria Branch, I was privileged to talk about our program, "Strangers No More—Women Building Cross-Cultural Friendships." Others shared what they had been doing, including collaborating with other organizations in their towns, such as the NAACP, the National Council of Negro Women, and Delta Sigma Theta, a Greek-lettered sorority of

college-educated women dedicated to public service with an emphasis on programs whose target audience is African Americans. Several Branches had reached out to Muslim and Hispanic women to discuss issues of concern to all. Some have worked with local universities to enlist speakers and another is partnering with a local elementary school to provide second graders with 100 copies of the book, Can I Join Your Club?, which celebrates the importance of diversity and friendship.

The telephone group also discussed promoting a cultural activity that has diversity and inclusion as its theme. Book, movie, and live theater suggestions generated considerable interest. Prominently mentioned is the new film about Harriet Tubman, Tubman.

One idea for an activity, in particular, captured my imagination, which I shared with one of our co-Presidents, Lane Stone, my collaborator in "Strangers No More: Women Building Cross-Cultural Friendships." Lane and I be using it as part of an informative evening we have planned for our upcoming THIRD gathering of women who want to cultivate relationships with women from different backgrounds and experiences. We hope

you will join us on Wednesday, 11 December 2019 from 6:00 - 8:30 pm at Alexandria's Beatley Central Library at 5005 Duke Street. Our theme for this gathering is "Winter Celebrations" and what they tell us about our varying experiences, beliefs, and

delights. You'll be hearing more about it soon. In the meantime, plan to come and bring a friend—it promises to be a fun and inspirational way to broaden and deepen the work we started last March.

#### Dr. Mahadevan (Dev) Mani:


