We are having a very busy September. We co-sponsored a forum with Mt. Vernon Voting Rights. Some of the most important facts that came out of the forum are:

1. If you mail-in your ballot, who must have a witness signature on the envelope. Last year, it was eliminated because of covid restrictions. It is reinstated this year.
2. Virginia has moved from #40 nationally to #12 nationally in the ease of voting over the last few years. This is a major achievement, but we still need to work on ex-felons regain their voting rights.
3. "It Can Happen Here". The very recent situation in Pennsylvania where the Senate has subpoenaed an extreme amount of voter information, including driver's licenses and social security numbers from all voters to hand over to an undisclosed and not yet chosen third person party for auditing is scary and designed to create a distrust of our election season. Your vote matters. Please vote. Early voting has started.

Our Meet and Greet, hosted by Danielle Beach, was very well attended. The food, as always, was excellent and we were all happy to see each other again and to welcome new members. The vote to incorporate our branch as a Virginia Non-Stock Corporation was passed.

Thank you to everyone who donated gift cards. They will be very welcomed by our new Afghanistan refugee residents.

Thank you for all of your participation and assistance in our group. Stay healthy.

## PUBLIC POLICY

### Virginia Kress

Virginia AAUW Public Policy Group held their ZOOM meeting on September 22nd. Here are a few bullet points on their policy priorities.

Get out the vote.

- Eligible Virginia voters must register or update their registration by October 12th.
- Absentee and early voting are currently in process. You must request an absentee ballot no later than October 22nd. Be sure to bring identification with your name and address on it or your voter registration card. If voting by mail, make sure you have a witness signature on your envelope.

Legislative priorities for Virginia AAUW

- Paid sick leave.
- Paid family and medical leave.
- Sexual harassment in the workplace.

CEDAW - United Nations Convention on Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women.

**Brief Background on CEDAW:** The CEDAW, adopted in 1979 by the UN General Assembly, is often described as an international bill of rights for women. It defines discrimination against women as “...any distinction, exclusion or restriction made on the basis of sex which has the effect or purpose of impairing or nullifying the recognition, enjoyment or exercise by women, irrespective of their marital status, on a basis of equality of men and women, of human rights and fundamental freedoms in the political, economic, social, cultural, civil or another field.”

The Convention provides the basis for realizing equality between women and men through ensuring women’s equal access to, and equal opportunities in political and public life – including the right to vote and to stand for election – as well as education, health and employment. States parties agree to take all appropriate measures, including legislation and temporary special measures, so that women can enjoy all their human rights and fundamental freedoms.

The United States has **not** ratified CEDAW. Other non-parties include Afghanistan, Iran, Saudia Arabia and North Korea. For more information and other links go to:

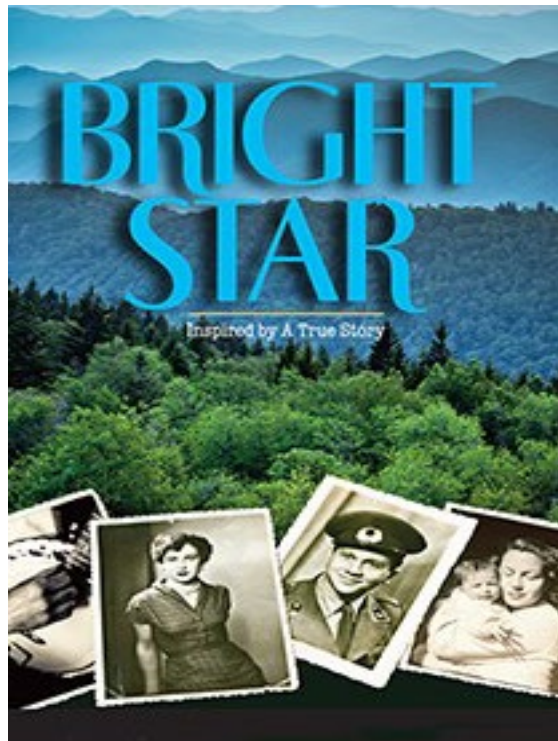

MUSIC, BOOK AND STORY BY **STEVE MARTIN AND EDIE BRICKELL**

**Synopsis:** Bright Star is the story of one woman at two different points in her life: the first, when she is a wild young thing growing up barefoot and carefree in the Blue Ridge Mountains of North Carolina; the second, when she is a well-to-do magazine editor in Asheville, 22 years later. Her story is inevitably woven with that of an idealistic young man named Billy, with whom she shares a mysterious connection. As a young teen in Zebulon, NC, Alice Murphy is hopelessly in love with small town heartthrob Jimmy Ray, the mayor's son. Although their love was pure, it falls victim to the interference of ambitious parents, and their infant son is whisked away before their happy ending could ever begin. Despite this tragedy, Alice strives on and follows her dreams. More than two decades later, Alice is the successful editor of the Asheville Southern Journal, and meets a promising young writer named Billy. Eventually they realize that they share a hometown, and when Alice sees the handmade sweater she knitted for her baby twenty years before in his personal belongings, she realizes that he is the son she lost so long ago.

## DIVERSITY BOOK GROUP

The Diversity Book Group met virtually in September to discuss The Mountains Sing by Nguyen Phan Que Mai, who created, as NPR described it, “a luminous, complex family narrative that spans nearly a century of Vietnamese history.” Most of the dozen plus members who attended found this work of historical fiction to be beautifully written if disturbing to read. Most also noted that it was their first opportunity to hear the story of the “Vietnam War” through the eyes of a Vietnamese author and from the particular perspective of someone from the North. A prolific poet and writer in her native Vietnamese language, Que Mai wrote this novel only in English. It has yet to be published in her homeland because the current Communist regime is unlikely to be sympathetic to her critical view of her country’s more recent history. The Mountains Sing is replete with universal themes—loss being a primary one as well as motherhood, family and obligation, war, commitment, compassion, forgiveness, and morality, to identify only a few. The Group will be meeting via Zoom from 7:00 - 8:30 pm on October 4 to talk about the controversial novel, American Dirt, by Jeanine Cummings.
