It is time for your ideas for next year's programs. We want you to contribute so we meet your needs. Please let me know what you would like to learn about.



Saturday, May 20, 2023, 10:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Alexandria Celebrates Women (ACW), Women's History Tour

The walk will be guided by ACW Co-Founder and Vice President, Gayle E. Converse. ACW is a volunteer 501(c)(3) charitable non-profit organization that recognizes the accomplishments and contributions of Alexandria's women of the past, present and future.

Arrive at the meeting spot at the Alexandria Visitor Center at 221 King Street by 10:20 a.m. Public parking is located at City Hall, 301 King Street, directly across from the tour starting point, as well as on adjoining streets. Restrooms are available at City Hall and in the Visitor Center.

ACW's tour follows "a walking route through historic Old Town Alexandria and will stop by many of the sites associated with a wide array of diverse and courageous women who have been an integral part of Alexandria's history. One stop will be at the site of the former federal courthouse in Alexandria where in 1917 the suffragists arrested for picketing in Washington, DC and imprisoned in the DC Workhouse in Occoquan, were tried and released. The Alexandria Branch received a mini-grant from AAUW-VA to contribute to the historic marker at this site. Another stop on the tour is the Kate Waller Barrett Branch of the Alexandria Library, site of the 1939 sit-in.

Because space is limited, advance registration is required no later than May 7. Sign Up Here.

Why Renew?

AAUW National



- More than 320 recipients received \$6 million in AAUW fellowships and grants for the 2022–23 academic year—the highest amount in our history! The funding advances educational and professional opportunities for women in the United States and around the globe.
- In the third year of the pandemic, AAUW continued to grow its online programs, hosting more than 58 webinars.
- AAUW's Start Smart and Work Smart salary negotiation trainings continued to be AAUW's most sought after programs, reaching more than 4,000 participants in 2022, and over 190,000 to date.
- We continued our work with Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) and other minority serving institutions (MSIs), thanks to a generous grant from The Coca-Cola Foundation. A total of 17 minority-serving colleges, including 8 HBCUs, 7 women's colleges and 2 MSIs, now offer AAUW's Start Smart training, bringing the number of colleges and universities currently hosting the program to 77.
- Our powerful annual National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) engage over 500 students from more that 300 college campuses nationwide through workshops, panels and an inspiring keynote from Nikole Hannah-Jones, creator of The 1619 Project.
- In its second year, AAUW's STEMEd for Girls program gave over 200 participants and their caregivers the opportunity to explore STEM subjects and careers.

- AAUW's Two-Minute Activists sent 19,539 letters to elected officials calling for action on AAUW priorities such as pregnant worker fairness, voting rights, confirming Ketanji Brown Jackson to the Supreme Court, and more.
- THE SIMPLE TRUTH THE ABOUT THE GENDER PAY GAP, 2022 Update used the earnings ratio of all workers for the first time including seasonal and part-time employees to capture a more accurate picture of the labor market. Previous versions of the report used only data of full time workers.

In this way, the country's education system has historically been considered an equalizer, a mechanism by which poor people get on equal footing with the wealthy, and Black people — once prevented from going to school — catch up with white people."

Is that really the way life works, or Is Meritocracy a Myth?

PUBLIC POLICY

There have been a number of incumbent retirements and changes in districts due to redistricting, which will make both early voting and regular voting a bit more challenging to navigate. AAUW-VA public policy group has sent some helpful information on how to manage the process.

EARLY VOTING FOR THE PRIMARY ELECTION WILL BEGIN ON MAY 5 IN FAIRFAX COUNTY (https://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/elections/early-voting) AND IN LOUDOUN COUNTY (https://www.loudoun.gov/182/Upcoming-Elections). Not all races and/or parties will have primaries. AAUW OF VIRGINIA WILL PROVIDE MORE INFORMATION AS THE PRIMARY AND GENERAL ELECTION APPROACHES. OUR BRANCH AND AAUW-VA WILL PROVIDE RESOURCES TO HELP YOU NAVIGATE THE CHANGES IN YOUR LEGISLATIVE DISTRICTS FROM REDISTRICTING. - Step 1: Enter your address and click "Find Now"
- Step 2: In the boxes for State Delegate and State Senator you will see the words "NEW IN" in red.
- Step 3: Click the **NEW IN** to see your new district for each.

There is a wealth of information for the upcoming election including the candidates in party nomination contests here.

VPAP also offers a daily digest of news stories from all over the commonwealth.

There may also be changes in your polling place so be sure to check your local polling websites for your correct polling site.

On other matters, Governor Youngkin signed a bill introduced by now Congresswoman Jennifer McClellan that extend the existing educational fund to help victims who were denied an education under the Massive Resistance. The original fund was created 20 years ago and starting this summer the fund will be available to their children and cousins.

The public comment period on Virginia's membership in the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative ended this week. Over 6,000 comments were logged and the majority of them supported Virginia's membership in RGGI. The comments will be reviewed but as of now the Governor continues to try to remove Virginia from RGGI via regulatory action.

The Diversity Book selected yet another winner to discuss in April. The Henna Artist by Ilka Joshi focused on the trials and tribulations of a young Indian woman in the 1950's, taking place primarily in the colorful city of Jaipur. There is nothing about the novel we could call a cliche, however. Despite the difference in time and place, many readers were struck by how relevant the story and themes are to life in the US at this moment. Many discussants noted the masterful writing—the cadence and language in particular. If you have an interest in women's resilience; the clash of classes, eras, and cultures; religion vs. superstition, the definition of success; and darn good story telling, members of the Diversity Book Group overwhelmingly recommend this novel for your reading pleasure and reflection.

I received a yellow post card and/or e-mail about an AAUW Data Verification / Oral History Project - Is this a scam?

No, it is not a scam – AAUW is working with PCI to update member data and ask members to participate in an Oral History Project. Post cards were received earlier than anticipated – and an email communication was sent to all members from AAUW on April 25th. It is important to note that if you do not receive our emails – you may be unsubscribed or in need of updating your email address with us.

What is the Oral History Project?

- The Oral History Project is an effort to collect and memorialize the memories, experiences and impact that AAUW membership has had on the lives of our individual members across the country. These stories will be compiled into both a digital and hardcopy bound book. There is also an opportunity for members to purchase their own copy of the book, as well as other AAUW branded items, if they so choose.

How will PCI be contacting me?

- PCI will contact AAUW members directly through postcards and emails, addressed to you from Katrina Sun Breese (Senior Director of Institutional Advancement), to encourage participation. PCI will not conduct outbound calls to members, except to return your calls.

Why are we doing this project?

- Data Verification While you may have received our post card and recently renewed your membership, we often find that emails and phone numbers are out of date. Updating your data ensure we can stay in touch with what is happening at AAUW and important information about your membership. It is also an added value that PCI is conducting this project, at no cost to AAUW National.
 - Thus far over 1/3 of respondents have updated their contact information.
- Oral History AAUW has a long and rich history, well-documented throughout the years in our Archives. We also employ a part-time Archivist and engage the volunteer Archive Corps to organize and maintain this history. That being said the lived experiences of every day members are not well-documented, nor shared broadly. This project will give us access to audio recordings, transcriptions of stories, and photos submitted from members who choose to participate. While conducting a project of this kind would typically be a significant investment, PCI is doing this work at no cost to AAUW.
