Alexandria Hospital: Women Mobilize the Community October 28, 2023, 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. The Lyceum, 201 S. Washington Street



Alexandria Hospital, Duke Street, 1917

Come join curator Kristin Lloyd on Saturday, October 28, 2023, 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. at Alexandria's History Museum at The Lyceum, 201 S. Washington Street, for a guided tour through the exhibit, *Alexandria Hospital: Women Mobilize the Community*, as well as some behind-the-scenes information.

According to City of Alexandria website: "Through the lens of women's activism... [this exhibit] marks the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of the Alexandria Infirmary-today's INOVA Alexandria Hospital."

Led by Julia Johns, in 1872 women met to organize the infirmary. Townspeople no longer had to travel to Richmond or Washington for hospital care. The first hospital facility was built in 1917 in the 700 block of Duke Street. For many years, the hospital was segregated. This exhibit...[highlights] the civic-minded women and organizations that founded and supported the Hospital, as well as the services provided to the white and black community."

### AAUW members faced violence to fight for civil rights in 1964 Freedom Summer in Mississippi!

They were called "communists" by segregation supporters.

A new play *Wednesdays in Mississippi* dramatizes the little-known activism of an inter-racial alliance of women who fought for civil rights in the South in 1964. Enraged at the exclusion of women from the 1963 March on Washington, Dorothy Height, director of The National Council of Negro Women, invited Northern women to join Mississippi women to struggle for voting rights, to support the Freedom Schools, and to aid the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party.

The "Wednesdays in Mississippi" coalition, which included the AAUW and the League of Women Voters, formed the only women's civil rights project led by a national organization.

Written by Nicole Burton, Wednesdays in Mississippi is produced by Pipeline Playwrights. Burton adapted the play for the stage from Debbie Z. Harwell's award-winning book by the same title. The November 11 performance will include a post-show discussion.

### Who are the Pipeline Playwrights?

Pipeline Playwrights strives to break through the glass ceiling women face in the American theater when they try to get their plays produced. The group of five mid-career women playwrights aims to close the theatre gender gap one play, one reading, one production at a time.

Pipeline Playwrights is based in Fairfax County, Virginia, and the digital world.

In 2018, Pipeline Playwrights launched "Our Time, Our Stories," a multi-year project to produce five new fulllength plays. After the pandemic hit, Pipeline quickly pivoted to Zoom and presented dozens of online readings and events, including a full production of the first play in the "Our Time, Our Stories" series, Ann Timmons' *A Very Present Presence.* In 2022, Pipeline began producing live plays again (*Heartland* by Patricia Connelly and *Unprotected* by Jean Koppen) but is committed to continuing to serve audience members unable to attend live theater because of disability, caregiving responsibilities, or economics.

Dear Danielle,

Thank you again for sponsoring my attendance at this year's NCCWSL! It was a life changing experience for me! I will admit that I was a bit intimidated initially, because I am 47 years old, and I expected that most of the attendees would be much younger than I was. And I was right. However, I realized right away that there was no need to feel intimidated. I immediately made two new friends at dinner on the first night, and we were stuck together like glue for the remainder of the conference! Beyond that, I was welcomed by all of the women who attended, and I was told on several occasions how much my story inspired some of them.

For me, the conference and the courses I participated in contributed so much to strengthening my identity, particularly as a woman and as a college student. The conversations I was blessed to have with some of the young women and the life lessons I able to share boosted my confidence in myself and my journey. I chose seminars that centered around activism and leadership development, and each seminar seemed to magically align with and build upon the other to provide the specific knowledge and opportunities for expression that I needed.

I learned that there are so many beautiful and intelligent women, of all backgrounds, ages and races that experience the same traumas in life, particularly in the workplace. And the most important lesson was that of the power of collaboration and the importance of seeing beyond petty differences to the bigger picture of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness for all of us!

I will forever be grateful for this opportunity, and I look forward to one day being able to pay it forward by

sponsoring another woman to attend and maybe even returning as a speaker and/or facilitator at NCCWSL at some point in the future. Thank you so very much again for sponsoring me, I am so very grateful, and I look forward to meeting you in person in September!


