It's Been a Busy Month for Branch Programs

On October 28, Branch members assembled at the Alexandria History Museum at The Lyceum for a private tour of the exhibit, *Alexandria Hospital: Women Mobilize the Community*, to celebrate the hospital's 150 years of service to the community. According to The Lyceum the exhibit highlights "...the civic-minded women and organizations that founded and supported the Hospital, as well as the services provided to the white and black community."

In 1872, nine years before AAUW was founded, empowered women, led by Julia Johns, organized an infirmary in Alexandria, so residents did not have to go to Washington or Richmond for hospital treatment. In 1917, a new hospital building was opened in the 700 block of Duke Street. In 1997, it became part of the Inova Health System.

Kris Lloyd, a curator in the Office of Historic Alexandria's new Division of Collections and Exhibitions, and the project manager of the hospital exhibit, gave us a gallery talk in the exhibit. She was joined by Jennifer Kilmer, MD, a retired ob/gyn and President of The TWIG. The TWIG is "the Junior Auxiliary of Inova Alexandria Hospital---an organization of women dedicated to providing financial aid, volunteer service, and support to Alexandria Hospital—itself originally established by volunteers" in 1933.

On November 18, Dr. Pamela Gilchrist, Director for K-12 Programs at the one-billion-dollar Virginia Tech Innovation Campus in Alexandria's Potomac Yard, spoke to us via Zoom. The

Innovation Campus has "set the goal to become the most diverse graduate technology campus in the country."

Plans for the campus were announced in November 2018 as part of Virginia's successful bid to attract Amazon's HQ2 headquarters to Northern Virginia.

Although the first new Academic Building is expected to open in 2024, the inaugural class of the Innovation Campus master's degree students enrolled in the fall of 2020 at the existing Virginia Tech space in Falls Church, and students have already graduated.

Dr. Gilchrist gave us a detailed overview of the Innovation Campus, especially talking about their partnership with the Alexandria City Public Schools, which provides training for teachers and hands-on STEM education opportunities and experiences for students, paving a way for future college study and careers in STEM fields. Our members asked questions and made suggestions to Dr. Gilchrist following her presentation.

Ready-to-eat meals








DIVERSITY BOOK GROUP

The Diversity Book Group finished the year (not meeting in December) by discussing the now 70+-year-old prize winning novel, The Bluest Eye, by the late acclaimed American author, Toni Morrison. The book was nominated and then selected by the group because it is frequently included on "Banned or Challenged" book lists, getting special attention in this arena in recent years. The Group wanted to see for themselves why the book might be included on these lists. There was unanimity that these lists should not exist. At the same time, some participants noted that the content is sexually explicit, includes child sexual abuse, and graphic domestic violence, including directed at children. The way in which other themes are presented, including racism, might not be appropriate for younger children, and there was some debate about when adolescents would be ready for much of this material. That said, everyone agreed it deserves all the accolades it has won. Although the book focuses on a small town in rural Ohio and features the lives of an impoverished Black community, many found the themes to be universal. The language, in particular, draws the reader in immediately as well as Ms. Morrison's ability to create real characters. In this novel, she reveals a gift for story telling even if the story provokes multiple negative feelings, including sadness and anger. The group will start the new year on Monday, January 11, 2024 discussing Mad Honey by Jodi Picoult and Jennifer Boylan Finney on line. 




FRANCOPHILE GROUP




KVELLS AND KUDOS
