Report on AAUW's Human Trafficking Forum held at the Ellen Coolidge Burke Branch of the Alexandria Public Library on May 11

Human trafficking survivor, Evelyn Chumbow, told of feeling trapped with no possibilities for escape, during the years she was enslaved by a wealthy woman in Potomac, MD. From age nine to 17 she cooked, cleaned, and cared for the woman's children with no payment for her work.

She suffered regular beatings and was cut off from the outside world. When she finally escaped with the help of several good people, Ms Chumbow's enslaver was sentenced to several years in prison.

Erica Reid, Senior Engagement Manager at the U.S. Department of Homeland Security Center Countering Human Trafficking, described how teenagers can be lured into being sexually trafficked. She showed a video featuring a lonely teenage girl who was being pulled into trafficking through an attractive teenage boy posing as a potential "boyfriend." An observant teacher became aware of changes in his previously cheerful and engaged student.

These included—falling behind in her homework, seeming unusually tired, admitting she'd given up her cell phone to her "boyfriend." She no longer had "time" for school work.

Ms. Reid provided warning signs for teachers, parents and other adults but also for potential victims of trafficking. Both speakers emphasized that labor and sexual trafficking are far more prevalent than we know. Because of trafficking's hidden nature, we must become extra alert to its warning signs. Ms. Reid works with the Blue Campaign within Homeland Security that works to eliminate trafficking.

Evelyn Chumbow is currently active in developing employment opportunities for

trafficking survivors and has provided human trafficking and human rights related service to the law firm of Baker and McKenzie LLP. She has received numerous awards and recognition of her service, such as the 2021 Abolitionist Award from the Nomi Network and the 2015 Peace Seeking Award from the Presbyterian National Church. She is currently the Operations and Survivor Leadership Director for the Human Trafficking Legal Center.

She focuses on educating the public on human trafficking and develops and offers media campaigns, provides awareness training to the public, and initiates partnerships with various organizations and agencies throughout the country. Both speakers made dynamic presentations and provided extensive informative on this topic. They distributed literature and posters on human trafficking from the Department of Homeland Security provided to the Human Trafficking Rescue Team.




DIVERSITY BOOK GROUP

Twelve members of the Diversity Book Group (DBG) met in May to discuss Steph Cha's Your House Will Pay. The novel, set primarily in 2019, explores the relationship between the African American and the Korean and Korean American communities in Los Angeles. It draws on two 1991 real life events—the shooting of an African American 15-year-old young woman by a Korean shop keeper and the beating of African American Rodney King by police, both in South Central LA. As with any well written novel, the themes are both timely and classic— forgiveness, redemption, inherited trauma, and parenting in these complicated times, to name a few. The book also paints a portrait of a variety of women, whose strength might be one of the only characteristics they share. Members of the group liked the book, drawn in by the well-paced story line and its easy read.

The DBG promises the next two months will be outstanding discussions of interesting books as well. On June 17, we will discuss the graphic novel Gender Queer by Maia Kobabe. You likely recall that this is one of the "banned" or "challenged" books we decided to read this year. You might also recall that participants agreed that another of these books that we read already —Toni Morrison's The Bluest Eye—proved to be gratifying and made for a lively and informative read. On July 15 we will tackle (560 pages) the work of another award winning author, Barbara Kingsolver, whose newest book, Demon Copperhead, was inspired by the classic David Copperfield. Those ambitious members who have already read it have noted that it too is a worthwhile read. 
MYSTERY BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP
