HUMAN TRAFFICKING FORUM

The Anti-Human Trafficking Team of the Alexandria branch invite you to learn about forced labor from Evelyn Chumbow and Erica Reid.



Evelyn Chumbow is a survivor of child labor trafficking turned anti-trafficking activist and public speaker who has focused her life's work on ending modern-day slavery, a crime impacting some 40 million victims globally.

Ms. Chumbow was brought to the United States from Cameroon at the age of nine and forced to cook, clean, and care for her trafficker's children. She was never paid for her work, and any hope that she might escape was undermined by the constant beatings she received from her trafficker.

After years of captivity, she finally escaped and her trafficker was sentenced to 17 years in prison. Today, Ms. Chumbow works tirelessly to raise awareness and advocate for other survivors.



Ms. Erica Reid is a Senior Engagement Manager at the U.S. Department of Homeland Security Center Countering Human Trafficking, Blue Campaign Office with over 18 years of government service. Specializing in public affairs and outreach, Erica uses her experience to raise awareness of human trafficking across the country. Within the Blue Campaign, her portfolio includes educating on the front-end to deter criminal activity and educate communities on how to recognize and report/respond to possible cases of human trafficking. Her portfolio focuses on youth and student leaders, adults working with youth, Native American/Tribal Nations, and Historically Black Colleges and Universities.

Erica has presented to over 5000 persons on human trafficking since joining the Blue Campaign office in 2022.

DIVERSITY BOOK GROUP

Our book for April, The Shadow King by Maaza Mengiste, is a work of historical fiction shortlisted for the 2020 Booker Literary Prize. It unfolds during the early 1930's during a period that was unknown to most Group members. The majority of the story chronicles Italy's attempt prior to World War II to conquer Ethiopia and focuses on the lives of the native warriors whose fierce defense of their country kept it out of Italian hands. The group shared the sentiment that it was a disturbing read on several levels, most prominently related to the brutality with which women were treated by the male characters in general and that of the Italians, as they sought to exercise their hegemony over an agrarian society. Shadow King is rich in themes, including what it means to be a male or female in terms of societal roles and expectations, the horrors and consequences of war, the nature of courage, the costs of antisemitism, misplaced violence, the importance of bearing witness and memorializing, and the meaning of patriotism. While we didn't have the opportunity to explore the question, an important one remains as it applies to this work as well as others of its nature—How does art, if at all, change the historical narrative? 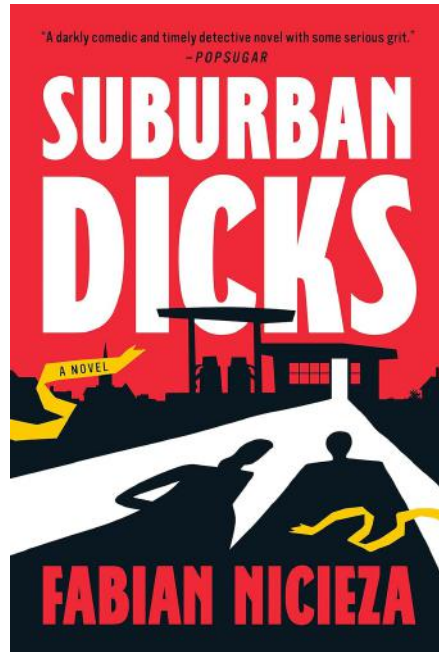
