#### AAUW ALEXANDRIA Fraud and Scam Workshop

On Saturday, Oct. 12th AAUW Alexandria sponsored, with the Alexandria Burke Library branch, an AARP program on Frauds and Scams. The outstanding AARP speaker, Trudy Marotta, spoke about how even the most experienced and well trained can get tricked. She taught about the importance of freezing your credit and those of your family members, especially children and keeping a physical file of the pin number and other essential information. She said never to pick up a phone from a robo-scammer. Once the machine knows it is a used number, it will continue Wait 5 seconds before speaking into a phone from an unknown number. numbers are being stolen and scammers will use your name, emails and phone number to steal from others. Always call someone directly if someone tells you that they are in trouble and need you to send money and gift cards. They are often fine and it is a scammer using AI to imitate a Another popular scam going around right now is the caller saying that there is a warrant out for your arrest for missing jury duty and you have to send money. A version of this is someone saying IRS, Medicare, Medicaid, bank or another official agency. organization or agency back at their regular, verifiable number, not the number given by the caller or texter. Be very careful of Caller ID on landlines. One place to check suspicious emails is spam@uce.gov. If you write checks, use a gel pen or a fine-tip Sharpie. Crooks have the ability to wash ink off of check amounts and change who the check goes to. Be very careful of dating sites and anyone who professes a deep emotional attachment too quickly and then wants money or a tangible asset.

# Grammy-award Winning Music Educator, ANNIE RAY, Speaks on her Success Working with Students with Disabilities

#### Our Speaker:

Annie Ray currently serves as both the Orchestra Director and Performing Arts Department Chair at Annandale High School (AHS) in the Fairfax County Public School (FCPS) system. Annie is an advocate for providing universal access to quality music education and is known for founding and developing creative opportunities to make music accessible to students of all demographics. Her establishment of the FCPS Parent Orchestra teaches about 200 caregivers annually to learn to play their student's instrument and provides mentorship to upcoming music teachers.

Annie also began the Crescendo Orchestra program to make Orchestra curriculum accessible to students with significant developmental or intellectual disabilities. In January 2022, this program was featured and acclaimed on the cover of the Metro section in The Washington Post.

TEDx invited Annie to give a talk in April 2022, on The Sounds of Success, based on her approach in the classroom and how to meet all students where they are at. She has been a guest lecturer at colleges across the country and keynote speaker at numerous national/international conferences, and was named the 2024 Grammy Music Educator Award recipient and the 2023 FCPS Outstanding Secondary Teacher of the Year for her work on equity in education.

Annie is a member of the StringRise professional development team. She is an active performing harpist and currently resides in Arlington, Virginia with her husband Dr. Irving Ray and their daughters Eloise and Millie. Annie is an adventurer at heart, and her biggest bucket list item is to one day win The Amazing Race.

On March 27-28, 1925, the seven already existing local branches of AAUW in Virginia met in Williamsburg. When they adjourned, the Virginia Division of AAUW was a reality.

On March 28, 2025, join us in Alexandria as the AAUW-VA centennial celebration begins, and we jubilantly begin our second century of women changing the conversation.

The conference is being hosted by the AAUW-VA Northern District branches at the Sheraton Suites Old Town Alexandria, 801 N. St. Asaph Street, Alexandria 22314 on Saturday, March 29, 2025, with preconference activities on March 28, 2025.

# Report on the AAUW Atlantic Regional Conference

One week before the Conference started, the weather was supposed to be nice. People were coming from Massachusetts to Florida. Issues on rooming, lunch times and pick up times were being resolved. Then Hurricane Helene blew up and many plans changed. Many of the people from Florida had to cancel, as their flights were cancelled. Only those who left early were able to make it. South and North Carolina also faced major difficulties. A train from North Carolina hit a tree and 10 attendees were stranded on it for almost 10 hours. Attendees came in at different hours than planned as their planes and trains were delayed. Laura Wimmer and the women from the Richmond Branch saved the day. They met attendees coming in and brought them to the Conference safely. The last one arrived at 10:00 p.m. on Friday night. They also brought people to the stations and airports on Sunday. They raised the concept of Conference to a new level and deserve a huge round of applause. In total, there were 130 attendees there, 7 guests and 35 presenters.

The Conference otherwise went very smoothly. Speakers presented on many topics. It was decided at an early meeting that this Conference needed to distinguish itself from State Conferences by doing a deep dive into issues that affect all of us. Some of the topics that were covered include AI, Title IV, how to grow small and virtual branches, Women's Health, Voting Rights, Public Education attacks, Period Poverty, Coalition building, ERA, DEI, Ranked Choice Voting, Social Media impact, STEM, Title I, Reproduction Freedom and Immigration. The sessions were broken in whole group presentations, trending topic sessions and swap shops, where branch ideas were exchanged

There was a worry about costs at the beginning of the year long work on the Conference. Costs were budgeted at 100 attendees and we met the original budget. There was a beautifully created program book and rave reviews. The food was delicious and plentiful. The location was lovely on a warm fall weekend.

Diane Schrier and Danielle Beach were the co-chairs and Lane Stone the welcoming state host.

# **PUBLIC POLICY**

Public policy is very important this year. It is involved with everything you do, i.e., breathe air, quality of water, food quality, fish in the ocean, housing, social security, Medicare, health care, financial equity, salaries, road, airports, etc. AAUW cannot handle all of these issues so we focus on issues relating to the well-being of women. The election on November 5<sup>th</sup> will be very important for women, so please be sure that you have chosen wisely. Many things will be determined by the outcome of the election.

In Virginia, starting in August, over 6000 voters were removed from the registration list. There is a lawsuit which we are supporting to release the names in time for mistakes to be corrected, or because of the late timing of the issue, have the executive order nullified. The names were connected to the files of the Dept. of Motor Vehicles list. When someone becomes a naturalized citizen, that may not be changed on the DMV list and thus, the person will be unfairly removed. As always, when there are multiple removals, names that are similar to other names, people who do not have licenses, etc. are unfairly removed from the voter rolls.

Another major issue the upcoming year is the new SOLs requirement. Experts have said that it will create a situation when 50-70% of public schools will fail. This is due to one section. It lowers the time span for students speaking a foreign language to have to take the standardized tests. It used to be 11 semesters. It is now 3. All the best research shows that it takes 6 semesters to become socially fluent and 14 semesters to be academically fluent. Alexandria has 127 different languages spoken. The legislature will be working this year on slowing these unfair standards so they will not affect too many schools too badly. We must support this battle.

Lobby Day is January 15<sup>th</sup>. There will be a meeting the night before at the Hotel. Please plan to come. More information will be forthcoming.
