Whether it is in conferences that praise a woman's only place is in her home with her children, the firings of women, the "bro" culture or the continuing difficulty that women have in breaking some glass ceilings, issues abound. AAUW wants full equity for Women. We stand for the need of women to be educated and to have financial and emotional security. We desire to protect women whether in the job, the home or in the classroom. It is essential that we stand together in these interesting times. It is true - there is strength in numbers.

On the weekend of March 28th, we are in charge of the Hospitality Suite at the State Conference being held in Alexandria. ### **PUBLIC POLICY**

Public Policy is on a roller coaster this year as both State and National issues are in flux. One very positive Virginia vote is the passing of the Paid Sick Leave bill. Also, the three constitutions amendments, marriage equality, restoring the right to vote for felons, and the right to female reproductive health, have passed and will be voted on next year. In addition to the many bills on maternal health, education also started out as a major focus of this year's General Assembly. The new accountability standards have some inadvisable repercussions on teachers, public education and students. Several bills were introduced into the General Assembly to slow down the speed of the integration into the curriculum. Bills were introduced to increase funding by revising the funding formula to include all staff personnel and subsidize schools based on the number of students. Bills to improve IDEA in Virginia were also incorporated into the budget. The budget was increased by over \$250 million over what the governor proposed to improve education. We now await what the Governor signs.

One very obvious issue is that what happens in Virginia is affected by what is happening in the National government. The strong tax base in Northern Virginia, which is the least dependent on Federal funding, helps fund many services including education in the more rural areas of Virginia, which also depends the most on Federal funding. However, as the tax base will be impaired by the recent firings, there will definitely be a ripple effect. Nothing happens in a vacuum.

The final version of the AAUW Public Policy Principles and Priorities will be going to the Board. It will then be voted on by the members. Higher education which is under direct attack Colleges and universities are losing grants in research and other forms which is a major focus. help fund them. If the Dept. of Education is dissolved, Pell Grants will be assigned to a different agency under different rules. USAid has had the majority of its employees fired and many of its previously authorized monies have still not been dispersed. Many other governmental agencies have also lost thousands. Congress must approve a budget or continuing resolution by March 14th. There are many differences between the House and Senate version. Under the guise of anti-immigration, the SAVE Act (HR 22) effectively removes the vote from all married women who have taken their husband's name. To reregister, they will need a passport or birth certificate to prove their citizenship. For many, who have been voting for years and decades, this may be very difficult, especially if they are unaware of this requirement. Eighty-three representatives have signed the 2025 version of this bill, which passed the House in There have been executive orders against DEI. However, executive orders cannot 2024 overrule a Congressional law. There has also been a Dear Colleague letter against DEI, to which the NAACP has responded. Again, these cannot overrule Congressional laws.

Congress is considering the Safeguard American Voter Eligibility (SAVE) Act, a bill that would create unnecessary barriers to voter registration by requiring citizenship documents—even though voters already affirm or verify their citizenship when registering.

**The SAVE Act is unnecessary and harmful**. It would make it harder for eligible voters—especially citizens of color—to register and cast their ballots. Compared to white citizens, citizens of color are three times more likely to lack access to required documents like passports or birth certificates. We should be making voting more accessible, not adding more obstacles.

Tell your members of Congress to oppose the SAVE Act and protect the freedom to vote!

#### MEMBER PROFILE

## Marilyn Zayas



How long have you been a member of AAUW and what was it that made you want to join? I don't remember when I joined AAUW in Puerto Rico, but I would say it was the late 90s or early 2000s. A friend took me to a Meet and Greet. I was living and working full time but interested in meeting new people and looking for a good bridge game. When I met some of the members, they explained the mission of AAUW, and I was hooked. I served as membership chairperson for a few years and worked on the NCCWSL committee, interviewing wonderful young women who wanted to make a difference.

Albany when it was a state college for teachers. I majored in Latin and minored in Spanish. My first teaching job was at a private girls school teaching Latin, Ancient History, and Geography. Then I had 2 children, got my MA, and was recruited by a suburban Albany NY high school that was in desperate need for a Latin teacher. Within 2 years the board decided to phase out Latin. I then went to get an additional MA in English. I continued in that school for 30 years. After 7 years (1976), I applied for a sabbatical and took my 2 girls (ages 11 and 9) to England to be with me while I studied British history and literature at the University of Nottingham. That year changed my life!!!

**Before moving to Alexandria, you were living in Puerto Rico.** Please discuss why you moved there and what was your experience. In 1974 I went with a group of teachers to PR for a February vacation. (I was recently divorced). I returned in 77 and then in 79, each time for a week's vacation. When I met the man who would become my husband years later, we traveled to PR and then, in 1986, I bought a condo on the beach 30 miles from SJ.



By 1989 I had decided that I wanted to know what it was like to live in PR. I applied for a leave of absence from the school in the Albany area, found a job in PR (by luck, at a prestigious private school which educated the kids of the "rich and famous" of San Juan), and spent 2 years figuring it out. Because I was close to retirement age, I returned to Albany for 5 years, finished in 1997, and returned to PR permanently. I became part of the SJ community, as well as part of the snowbird community at the beach. I loved it. My husband

died in 2014; Maria hit in 2017; I was in my 70s. Time to return to the US. Reluctantly.

When you are in Alexandria, what keeps you busy? When I moved here, I wanted to continue working with kids, as I had all my life. Finally I found a job at a tutoring center in McLean and I have been with them for 7 years now. I worked 3--4 nights a week until this year, when driving at night and weather challenges have forced me to work from home, mostly as a support person.

I love theater (Kennedy Center, ShakespeareTheater Company, Signature Theater, and American Shakespeare Center in Staunton) and I travel: This year I will explore Ireland, visit friends in England, and then look forward to a river cruise on the Danube. My goal with travel is to understand more cultures, not just look at old buildings. I will do this for as long as I am able. By the way, I have taken each of my granddaughters on a trip, something for which they will always remember their grandmother. (Paris -the artist. Milan-the fashionista. Rome-the Latin student. Costa Rica- the warm weather and beach kid.)

I belong to two book clubs, one here and one in Puerto Rico. I have rejoined the Great Decisions group. I have a wonderful family: a daughter in Arlington with 2 lovely girls (one goes off to college in the fall) and a daughter in Asheville, whose girls are on their own working and living in Brooklyn. I'll be seeing them in May; we just got tickets for Broadway!
