PUBLIC POLICY REPORT

Hope is a very fragile thing but it is the one thing that in this very interesting time we must cling to. Advocacy with standing up for what we believe in is part of that hope. We stand together to fight for the issues that matter so much to us: education, voting, health, fair pay and equal rights for all people. In my travels throughout the Country this summer, women came up to me and said that my words, espousing what AAUW stands for, gives them hope. We live in a silo of aware, educated women supporting each other, but throughout the Country, many of our sisters are in despair, wondering what other rights they are going to lose and how they are going to face their children and grandchildren who will live with fewer rights. We must reach out to others. We must continue to speak out. We must not be afraid.

Washington D.C. continues to be occupied, but the crime rate has barely budged. Chicago may have National Guard installed in it. Our restaurants are hurting, and many small businesses are feeling intense pressure as people stay home and cut back on their shopping, The producer price index, which measures inflation before it hits consumers, rose .9% in July and wholesale prices rose 3.3%. Wholesale food prices rose 1.4% from June with a 38.9% increase in vegetable prices. The Big Beautiful Bill is already having an effect as some rural hospitals are beginning to close. ICE arrests have surged in Northern Virginia.

Our nearby universities are under attack. George Mason University has been targeted for DEI, and the University of Virginia president has been forced out. Many universities, like Columbia, Duke, etc. have given millions of dollars to the Dept. of Education for policies that involve diversity, equity and inclusion. \$785 million of health research funding has been cut due to that reason. Young scientists have been especially hurt, and overseas universities are eagerly offering them spots. Many international students have had their visas terminated and have instead registered at overseas schools. This has also hurt the funding of our schools.

Our Alexandria school system has bravely stood up to the anti-trans hysteria, but is now facing a financial burden of being forced to request reimbursement for educational expenses. Four other northern school districts are also being manhandled this way, misusing the wording of Title IX, which was designed to help protect students. Issues of busing and redistricting while modernizing schools in Alexandria are also under discussion.

The last Virginia General Assembly removed the cap on funding for staff positions. However, as much educational revenue in Virginia comes from the Northern Virginia tax base, it is expected that next year's revenue stream will be tighter and hurt educational advances.

The upcoming election will determine whether the 3 Constitutional Amendments, passed by the General Assembly last year, will pass this year and become law. They are based on the fundamental right to reproductive freedom, the right for non-violent felons, after completing their sentence to vote and the removal of the clause in the Constitution that says marriage can only be between a man and a woman. The election will also determine issues like paid sick leave, maternal health, wage history, and education standards. Everyone needs to vote as the issues in this Virginia election are very important and the eyes of the Nation will be watching.






