PUBLIC POLICY REPORT

Election fever is spreading right now as candidates constantly call for our attention. Amidst all the noise, it is important to remember our priorities and what values that we hold. Then we look for candidates that support them the most. The AAUW Voter Guides will be online in the State Website under Public Policy. Please take time to look at them, so that you can make informed decisions about your vote. Our Public Policy Priorities are also on the State Website. Our Lobby Day is scheduled for February 5th.

Charie Kirk's life path and murder remind me of Malcolm X. When young, as Charlie Kirk was, he was a firebrand, fighting for his beliefs. As he matured, his beliefs did also and he turned to a wider vision of people. Besides the tragedy for his young children and his wife, it is impossible to know how Charlie Kirk might have matured and become wiser with age. Malcolm X also died leaving a wife and young children. Violence should never be the response to political beliefs. It is time to stop the acceptance of the myth of the frontier gun culture, at the cost of school children, shoppers, politicians or others doing innocent activities.

However, many are using this tragedy to advance their own political gains and agendas. This type of behavior will only lead to more death. The United States had the reputation of being "The City On The Hill". We never achieved perfection, but we aimed on an irregular course to doing what was right for all people. That was in the concepts of both the Declaration of Independence and Constitution.

Alexandria City Public Schools have decided to join Arlington Public Schools and Fairfax Public Schools to appeal the decision of the Department of Education to withhold funds based on a Title IX case, Grimm vs. Gloucester County School Board. The plaintiffs assert that the Dept. of Education interpretation is incorrect.

As of this writing, the U.S. House has decided to make a Continuing Resolution that will last for 7 weeks, before finalizing the 2026 Budget. The Senate has rejected it. The House bill follows President Trump's desires for education. Overall Department of Education funding would be cut by 15%. Federal Student Aid for college and beyond would be cut by \$1.4 billion. Title I school funding would be cut by 27% or \$5.2 billion. Funding for Teacher Training and professional development would be completely eliminated. Funding for Pell, TRIO and GearUp levels unfunded. IES (research within the Department) would be cut by 80%. The General Assembly subcommittees are meeting now to find ways of dealing with the expected tax loss for Virginia from the Federal firings and grant eliminations.

AAUW has asked the Department of Education to release the Child Care Access Means Parents in Schools (CCAMPIS) grant application. Approximately 20% of postsecondary students are parents and by delaying the funds, their education is put at risk. It is expected that the Family and Medical Leave (FAMILY) Act will be reintroduced. If passed, this will create a national

paid family and medical leave insurance program. Both of these actions will help women, who are often the primary caregiver of their families.

The newly released US Census Bureau data shows that the gender pay gap has widened for the second consecutive year. The data shows that Black women earn 65 cents full time but 63 cents overall. White women receive 77 cents full time and 73 cents overall. Asian American women earn 96 cents full time and 85 cents overall. Hispanic women earn 58 cents full time and 54 cents overall

It is essential that all women stand together to fight inequity. What happens to any of us affects all of us. As John Donne wrote "No Man is an Island, Entire unto Himself."

Member Profile Zohreh Khoshnamak



Zohreh Khoshnamak is a dynamic STEM education leader and social entrepreneur based in Alexandria, Virginia. Born and educated in Iran, she has successfully transitioned her extensive background in journalism and communications into impactful nonprofit leadership in the United States.

Khoshnamak began her career in Tehran, where she spent two decades as a distinguished journalist, editor, and communications specialist. Her journalism work included contributions to national publications and collaboration on World Bank projects as a social science researcher.

After eight years of working in the field informally in Alexandria, Khoshnamak founded the Chrysalis Development Group Corporation, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization providing affordable STEAM programming for students from elementary through high school. As CEO, she successfully transformed an informal community initiative into a fully established organization, building strategic partnerships with Alexandria City Public Schools and the city's Recreation, Parks & Cultural Activities department.

From 2015 to 2023, Khoshnamak founded and chaired the Watergate Science Club for the children a parents at her condo community. She also established the Watergate Robotics Team (the Tech Troopers) and has served on various educational boards, including the Alexandria PTA Council and ACPS Grading Committee.

Her deep care for the community drives every initiative she leads, ensuring that equity, inclusion, and opportunity remain at the core of her work—creating spaces where all children and families feel seen, supported, and inspired.

Autumn Leaves





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

AAUW Falls Church Branch


The Falls Church Branch recently discussed the fact that misogyny is thriving and women's advancement is stalling. That conversation prompted them to develop a two-part community forum Healing the Gender Divide in the Era of Pervasive Social Media. The forum provides research on widespread attitudes that directly harm AAUW priorities: equality, individual rights and social justice; economic security, and education.

The first forum will address the state of men and the state of women in our society, particularly how misogyny affects gender equity and the power of social media in reinforcing harmful gender attitudes. A representative of Equimundo https://www.equiundo.org, (a research organization which recently published The State of American Men 2025) will discuss the complex crisis of boyhood and manhood. A representative of Center for American Progress, Inclusive Economy https://www.americanprogress.org will focus on the "state of women" and the impact of misogyny and corrosive social media on the lives and livelihoods of women. The first Community Forum will be held November 6, 2025, 7:00 - 9:00 PM at Mary Ellen Henderson Middle School, Falls Church.

A second forum to be scheduled in spring 2026 will address solutions and means to become engaged. Feedback from local educators and counselors will laser-focus the global problem, discussing what's happening in our own schools and communities.
